CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 A.M. by Linda Rudie, Board Chair.

2(a). Board Chair Report

2(b). The Board is still seeking to fill the Private Sector Membership. Amy Parrish has agreed to stay on until the Private Sector membership is filled. Erin Kelly's resignation was acknowledged. 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ITEM 3 Legislative/Regulations Committee
3(a). The 2023 Draft Legislation was presented and reviewed by the Board. Alan Heck made a Motion to approve the Bill Draft. Naomi Howell provided a 2nd to the Motion. Motion passed. 8 in favor, 0 opposed, 0 abstained

ITEM 4 Workforce Recruitment and Alternative Considerations
Cliff Mitchell presented at the meeting
Dr. Cliff Mitchell addressed the Board to discuss two distinct topics. The first topic presented was a possible pathway for an educational collaboration with Morgan State University. This collaboration would potentially be beneficial to the profession of Environmental Health Specialists in that there would potentially be a certificate program that would allow learners to train to be an EHS while acquiring the necessary education to fulfill licensing requirements. The second topic that was discussed and integrated into the conversation about the first topic was a grant application to CDC that Dr. Mitchell is making that seeks to Strengthen the U.S. Public Health Infrastructure, Workforce and Data Systems. Dr. Mitchell was seeking the Board's support for the grant application. Naomi Howell made a Motion to support the letter with edits. Alan provided a 2nd to the Motion. Motion passed. 8 in favor, 1 opposed – Matthew Cumers and 0 abstained.

5(b). Bert provided updates on the Docuexplorer training. He is putting together a Scope of Work for the Scanning proposal.

5(d). The continuing education credits for the 2021 license expiration has been completed. There were 12 licensees placed into non-renewed status resulting from not meeting the continuing education requirement.
