FUNERAL SERVICE DECORUM

Funeral Services are difficult events not only for the immediate family of the deceased, but also for those in supporting roles...relatives, friends, coworkers, and neighbors. Basic ideologies:

ACKNOWLEDGING THE LOSS...

- Be a good listener. If the family wants to talk about their loved one, let them.
- Always refer to the deceased by his/her name, i.e., Jane or John Doe.
- Focus on the needs of the family members and survivors, not on yourself, or your grief, etc.

ATTENDING THE FUNERAL...

- Arrive on time. Pay your respects to the family and offer sympathy. Once you have spoken to the family member(s), swiftly find your seat for the service.
- **Dress appropriately.** Guidelines calling for traditional formal black attire no longer exist. However, dressing conservatively remains a sign of respect. Attention should be on the mourners of the deceased and not inappropriate attire.
- Sign the Register Book, don't assume the grieving family will recall who all were in attendance.
- **Do NOT take photos,** unless you have been asked by the family to record the event. Any photography should be approved by the family prior to the service.
- **Be quiet.** Unless you are at the viewing, keep conversations to a minimum. Turn off cell phones, tablets, cameras, or other electronic devices.
- **Children:** Often children provide needed comfort, but do not allow them to be disturbing or active. Should they become agitated, excuse yourself and escort them from the service.
- Never bring food or beverages into the funeral or chapel, unless it is a bottle for an infant.

TRAVELING TO THE CEMETERY ...

- Follow the instructions of the funeral director, establishment, or other personnel.
- Use your headlights and emergency flashers while in the funeral procession.
- As the procession approaches stop signs or intersections where the light is red, continue through the intersection with extreme caution.
- Stay in close proximity to the vehicle ahead of you.
- Keep voice levels to a minimum. Do <u>NOT</u> engage in cell phone conversations.
- **Graveside seating** is for the immediate family members, guests with disabilities, and the elderly all other guests should stand.
- Do NOT sit or lean on memorials or gravestones.
