

In Fiscal Year 25:

The Carroll County Health Department had a total budget of \$22,950,577


- Approximately 59% of the funds came from grants. About 11% of grant funds were competitive and non-continuous.
- Collections, which are from paid services, accounted for 4.4% of the total budget.
- The State of Maryland supplied nearly **20%** of our budget in core funding, while Carroll County Government provided **17%**.

Our Bureau of Prevention, Wellness, and Recovery provides a range of prevention initiatives to address community wellness issues such as substance abuse, overdoses, and suicide. We work with community partners and community members to ensure that we are reaching people across the county. We coordinate services and support for individuals with behavioral health needs, and support Behavioral Health providers.

Community Impact

Substance Abuse Prevention Services:

- 1,733 individuals were reached through drug and alcohol educational presentations.
- 1,672 individuals attended events focused on all-substance prevention.
- 2,100 middle school students were reached through Don't Believe the Lie.
- 75 first responders were served through education and outreach events.
- 13 providers were educated about cannabis.
- 599 pounds of medication were disposed of properly.
- 643 youth were served through the Resiliency Program.




Tobacco Awareness:

- 611 individuals were educated about tobacco use or vaping prevention.
- 70 tobacco awareness campaigns were shared.
- 7,746 students were educated about the dangers of electronic smoking devices.
- 135 individuals participated in smoking cessation programs.

Tobacco Sales Enforcement Program:

- 181 vendor education visits were made.
- 1,517 tobacco sales compliance checks were completed, which is three
 times the number of compliance checks made in FY 2024. Compliance
 check visits involve trained underage buyers who, accompanied by law
 enforcement, attempt to purchase tobacco from various vendors in the
 community.





Community Impact

Mental Health Support Services:

- The Mobile Crisis Team was dispatched **277** times, provided **13** face-to-face follow ups, and supported **182** cases that were safely managed at home.
- 172 individuals received crisis response resources.




- 5 new individuals enrolled in the Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion (LEAD) program, a diversion program for individuals with unmet behavioral health needs.
- 63 individuals were served by the Homeless ID Project.
- 301 unduplicated individuals were served by the Wellness Recovery Center.
- 115 individuals were served through State Care Coordination.
- 22 officers received Crisis Intervention Training to respond to incidents involving individuals with behavioral health issues or developmental disabilities.
- 251 CIT referrals were completed by trained officers.

Community Impact

Behavioral Health Services:

- 112 trainings and community harm reduction education sessions were provided.
- 60 individuals received peer coaching and mentoring through Drug Court.
- Peer recovery support services served **339** individuals.
- 78 community events were held by Recovery Support Services.
- Re-entry services at the Detention Center and in the community resulted in **175** re-entry assessments, **18** transition plans, and **79** warm handoffs.
- **339** encounters for individuals receiving coaching, linkages and recovery plans were documented by staff.
- There were 12 screenings for students referred for substance use.
- The Quick Response Team reached **56** individuals with services including naloxone leave behind and peer navigation and linked **15** individuals with services and/or treatment.
- 8 individuals were served by the START Program.
- 742 individuals served by HR team unduplicated for access harm reduction.
- **2,060** service encounters (duplicated) for access harm reduction.



Naloxone Training and Outreach:

• 13,618 doses of Naloxone were distibuted, a 42% increase from FY 2024. This was done in part through 16 newspaper-style distribution boxes across the county.
















Bureau of Administration

Community Impact

Administration provides birth and death certificates. They administer Medical Assistance (MA), MA Transportation, and Maryland Children's Health Program services, and provide free care coordination for individuals with Medical Assistance.

Administration staff coordinate our interpreter and clinical support services. Administration promotes grant opportunities for community partners, develops contracts and agreements, and hires and supports staff. Administration houses our operations, finance, IT, procurement, human resources, health planning, communications, and emergency preparedness teams.

- **4,279** birth certificates were issued.
- 7,618 death certificates were issued.
- 7,387 individuals were served with Medical Assistance transportation.
- 13,740 rides were provided for individuals with Medical Assistance Transportation.
- 1,298 hours of interpretation services were provided.



• **587** clients received help to navigate and use their Medical Assistance/Health Choice insurance.

Medical Assistance

- **3,199** adults, not including pregnant women, received help applying for Medical Assistance.
- Staff assisted with **150** Medical Assistance applications for pregnant women and **2,592** Maryland's Child Health Insurance Program (MCHP) applications for children.









Community Health Services (CHS) offers a range of health services to fill gaps in the community. Many services are no-cost or offer sliding scale fees and serve individuals who are uninsured or underinsured, though we can accept private insurance for some services.

Our reproductive health clinic offers a range of family planning, testing and gynecological services. Our dental clinic re-opened this year with a new dentist and dental team; they currently serve children and pregnant women with Maryland Healthy Smiles.

CHS monitors diseases in the community and provides vaccinations to uninsured and underinsured individuals and through limited clinics. CHS staff partner with other CCHD programs and community agencies to assess the wellness of individuals in the community, and offer health and wellness information and support. Our Health on Wheels mobile clinic allows CHS and all bureaus to provide services throughout the county.

Our Health Promotion programs work to prevent injuries through education and support, including car seat installation, safe sleep education, and bike safety. They also offer chronic disease prevention and management education and resources.




Community Impact

Cancer Screening Programs

- Colonoscopies and appointment support were provided for **45** underinsured and uninsured residents.
- 272 underinsured or uninsured women received breast and/or cervical cancer screenings. This program has served over 200 individuals per year for the past 4 years.





Adult Evaluation and Review Services (AERS)

• 443 individuals were evaluated and referred to appropriate services.

Communicable Disease

- 94 outbreak investigations were completed.
- 2,726 reportable disease cases were reviewed.
- 63 individuals were treated for rabies exposure.
- 121 adults were vaccinated for the flu in partnership with Access Carroll.
- 135 adults received other vaccines.
- 270 HIV tests were administered.
- 241 Hepatitis C tests were administered.

Community Impact

Maternal/Child Health

- 294 children with special healthcare needs were served.
- 582 children received 1,220 immunizations in our clinic.
- 9,793 children were vision-tested and 10,043 children were hearing-tested in schools.

Oral Health

- 149 children were seen for dental care.
- 27 pregnant women received dental services.


Reproductive Health

- 766 clients were served.
- 886 clinical visits were conducted..
- 9.6% male client visits.

Women, Infants, and Children (WIC)

- 1,463 individuals on average per month received WIC benefits.
- 77% of WIC babies were breastfed at 6 weeks of age.

Individuals On Average Per Month Received WIC Benefits By Year




Community Impact

- The HOW participated in 81 events.
- 1,686 community members received education and/or services.

People Health on Wheels (HOW) Has Served By Year




Community Health Promotion

- **16,610** individuals were reached with information about injury prevention at events.
- 172 car seats were installed.
- 93 car seats were loaned, the highest number since pre-COVID levels.
- 17 new members enrolled in Chronic Disease Prevention programs.

Bureau of Environmental Health

The Bureau of Environmental Health helps keep the public safe from injury and illness through a variety of programs and services. Many services are mandated by state laws designed to protect health. Food permits and inspections help ensure food for sale is safe to eat; septic permits help keep systems safe for homeowners and the environment.


We work with the Maryland Department of the Environment and the Maryland Department of Agriculture to monitor environmental indicators such as air and water quality. Our rabies program assists residents with exposures to wild or stray animals to prevent this deadly disease.

Community Impact

Rabies

- 144 rabies samples were submitted for testing.
- Staff provided consultation and support for **536** rabies exposures.
- 248 pets were vaccinated for rabies at low-cost clinics.


Permits and Licenses Issued

- 255 septic system permits were issued (new construction and repair).
- 942 temporary food permits were issued.
- 41 food service plan reviews were issued.
- 10 best available technology systems were installed.
- 5 properties were funded by the Bay Restoration Fund (BRF).

Safety Inspections

- 882 food service facility inspections were completed.
- 161 temporary food service event inspections were completed.
- 72 sewage haul company inspections were completed.
- 156 safety inspections complaints were completed.
- 657 transient non-community water samples were collected.
- 165 pool inspections were completed.
