



Guide to Successful Goals, Objectives, and Outcomes

Why Does This Matter?

Successful grant proposals hinge on clear communication between your organization and the funder. Goals, Objectives, and Outcomes form the foundation of your evaluation plan, proving you can deliver measurable results, not just good intentions.

Understanding the Terms

Think of your project like planning a road trip from Ocean City:

- **Goal:** The destination (getting to Deep Creek Lake in McHenry).
- **Objective:** The measurable markers you need to hit (reaching Frederick by Day 3).
- **Outcome:** What changes because of the trip (you feel renewed).

	Definition	Key Traits	Importance to Funder
Goals	The broad, long-term, visionary end result of your program. It addresses the problem you identified in Statement of Need section.	Abstract, aspirational, general, and often hard to measure within the grant period.	Shows them your Big Picture vision and purpose.
Objectives	A step or target that you will achieve within the grant period. These should be Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant, and Time-Bound (SMART).	Concrete, precise, measurable, and focuses on what will be accomplished.	Lays out your Actionable Plan and provides a roadmap for success.
Outcome	The observable, measurable change in knowledge, behavior, skills, attitudes, or condition that results from achieving your objectives.	Result-oriented & answers the question: "How did the participants or community change?"	Demonstrates your Impact and shows the return on their investment.



Goals, Objectives, and Outcomes Examples

Let's use an example of a program aimed at training unemployed adults for new technology jobs in Southside Baltimore

Goal (Broad): To significantly reduce chronic unemployment and increase economic mobility for residents in the Southside Baltimore community.

SMART Objectives

"By December 31, 2026, the Career Training team will enroll 50 unemployed adults from the Southside community in a 12-week coding certification program."

Objective Element	Example Statement
Specific (S) (Who, what, where)	The Career Training team will enroll 50 unemployed adults from the Southside community...
Measurable (M) (The number)	...in a 12-week coding certification program...
Achievable (A) (Realistic scope)	(This is feasible given the current training facility capacity.)
Relevant (R) (Aligned with goal)	...to prepare them for in-demand tech jobs (directly supporting economic mobility).
Time-Bound (T) (The deadline)	...by the end of the first program year (December 31, 2026).

Outcomes & Metrics

These are the measurable changes that result from the objective and lead to the goal.

	Outcome (Change)	Metric (Proof)
Short-Term Outcome (Knowledge/Skills)	Participants will gain professional-level coding skills.	90% of participants will pass the industry-recognized certification exam.
Mid-Term Outcome (Condition/Behavior)	Participants will secure employment.	75% of certified participants will secure full-time employment in a tech-related field within 90 days of program completion.
Long-Term Outcome (Impact)	Participants will achieve financial stability.	Participants' average annual wages will increase by 40% compared to their pre-program income, as measured in a one-year follow-up survey.
