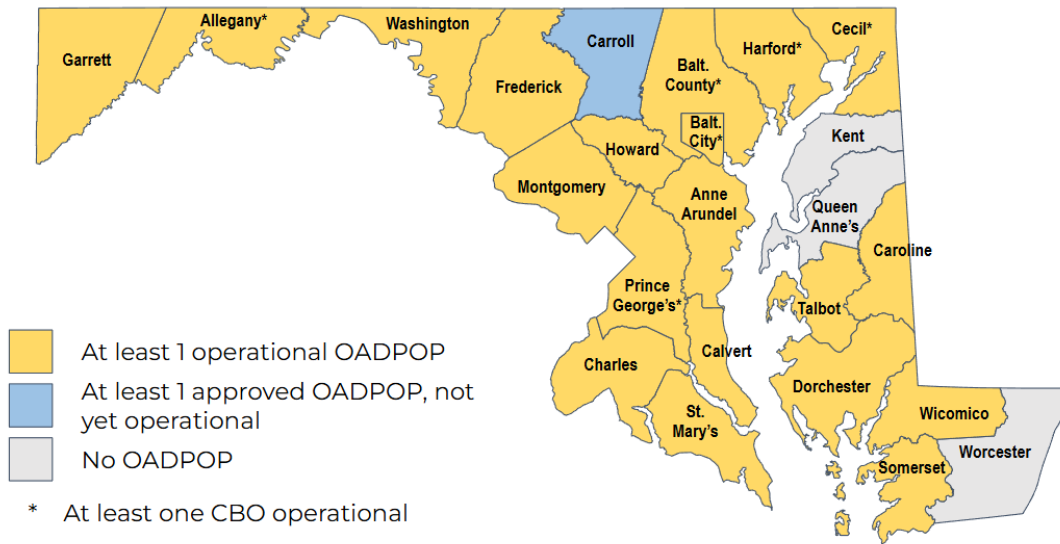

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What is this Vendor Guide For?

This Opioid-Associated Disease Intervention and Outreach Program (OADPOP) Vendor Guide compiles information received from state-authorized OADPOPs in Maryland on vendors they have used to purchase supplies needed for program operations, links to OADPOP application information, and a summary of statutory requirements. Inclusion of any vendor, product, or service does not constitute endorsement or recommendation by the Maryland Department of Health (MDH) or the Behavioral Health Administration (BHA) and is provided solely as a reference resource. Programs are solely responsible for evaluating options, verifying current pricing and availability, and ensuring that any purchases comply with all applicable laws, regulations, and state policies.

The guide is intended for use by state-approved OADPOPs and organizations interested in becoming OADPOPs or others planning to implement services. It may be used to inform budgeting and supply planning. Sections are organized by vendor and reflect feedback collected through surveys of Maryland OADPOPs (13 programs in 2022 and 5 programs in 2025). Information is subject to change and is provided as a starting point to help programs identify potential sources for supplies. For questions, contact mdh.syringeservices@maryland.gov.

Establishing a New OADPOP

All programs that wish to dispense syringes in Maryland must apply to become an OADPOP via the [State of Maryland Application](#). This action is a requirement by state statute. OADPOP Legislation

Immunity from Prosecution for OADPOP Affiliates

MD Health-Gen Code § 24-908 (2016)

- (a) Immunity from prosecution. A program staff member, Program volunteer, or Program participant may not be arrested, charged, or prosecuted for violating § 5-601, §5-619, § 5-620, or § 5-902(c) or (d) of the Criminal Law Article for possessing or distributing controlled paraphernalia or drug paraphernalia whenever the possession or distribution of the controlled paraphernalia or drug paraphernalia is a direct result of the employee's, volunteer's, or participant's activities in connection with the work of a Program authorized under this subtitle.

Additional OADPOP Resources

Overdose Response Programs

Before your program may become an OADPOP, you must first become an authorized Overdose Response Program. This approval will allow your program to dispense naloxone into your community. Please visit the [OHR ORP Page](#) to learn more about applying today!

Wound Care

All of our OADPOPs are required to provide wound care assistance to program participants. This can be done through a referral process or done on-site through hands-on care or wound care supply distribution. Drug Checking

[Rapid Analysis of Drugs](#) (RAD) is a partnership with the National Institute for Standards and Technology (NIST) to test drug residue voluntarily provided by Syringe Service Program participants using Direct Analysis in Real Time Spectrometry (DART-MS). OHR partners with existing SSPs to provide drug checking services for all participants enrolled in OADPOP services. Please reach out to margaret.rybak@maryland.gov with any questions.

Referrals

All OADPOPs are required to refer the following services to participants if they are not already provided on-site:

- Substance-related use disorder counseling, treatment, and recovery services
- Testing for HIV, viral hepatitis, and STDs
- Reproductive health education and services
- Wound care
- Overdose education and naloxone distribution

Program experience/feedback: NASEN is a national supplies vendor and buyers club. They maintain a wide selection of supplies. You must sign up on their homepage to become a buyer or email staff directly. It is also useful to know that you must pay in advance to receive these items, which some entities are unable to do; talk to your fiscal team before purchasing. Programs have experienced large delays on essential supplies as well as price increases without notification. These are things to look out for prior to purchasing.

This is the host site for items listed for auction by the federal government. Relevant items include medical supplies, safe use and prevention kits from the Veterans Administration (VA), PPE, and a plethora of office items, computers, monitors, vehicles, tools, and more.

Basic Wound Care Kit Supplies

Encourage participants with skin issues and/or wounds, or just want to keep an eye on their skin for fear of developing a skin issue, to use a phone to take pictures of wound progression and/or healing process. Photos on the phone will give the person a time stamp (date/time) to compare their photos of the area.

Basic wound care supplies:

- Vaseline/A&D ointment/triple antibiotic ointment
 - Moisture regulation for wounds
- Paper tape
 - Secure dressing, easy to tear, and easy on skin, easy to write on for time stamping purposes
- ABD pads (abdominal pads) -5in x 9in
 - Absorbent and provide padding
- Rolled gauze (Kerlix)-4-1/2" x 4-1/8 yd. Size, Large
 - Long and wide enough to cover large wound securely, can be cut for multiple uses
- Gauze sponges (non-sterile, not individually wrapped)-size 4x4
 - Absorbent-can be used to clean wounds, use as dressing directly on wounds, and used as padding. 4inx4in would cover most wounds and allow you to cut if the wound is smaller.
- Coban (aka "sticky gauze") (2 or 3 in)
 - Secure the rolled gauze or dressing on the wound better than pieces of tape, which gives some protection from the elements
- Water bottle (disposable or reusable)
 - Cleanse/flush the wound debris before dressing it
- Hand sanitizer
 - Wash hands before and after wound care
- Gloves
 - Various sizes if it encourages people to clean/redress or have someone clean/redress their wounds
- Xeroform sheets (5in x 9in)
 - Yellow, petrolatum-based occlusive dressing that keeps air out, which can help to protect the area while also promoting a moist environment for healing.
- Fabric bandages (of various sizes)
- Benzalkonium Chloride (BZK antiseptic wipes)
 - Antiseptic wipe without alcohol for cleansing of hands and body to decrease bacteria on skin without soap and water.

Other items that are helpful but not necessary:

1. Permanent markers

- Mark the possible growth of a wound and/or inflammation and label the dressing with date

2.. Foam dressings

- Helpful but not necessary, easier to change and monitor wound bed, some padding to protect the wound.

3. Non-adherent gauze pads

Injection Alternative Kits

Injection Alternatives (inhalation, powder, boofing kits) are designed to engage people who use drugs who do not inject, both inject and use different routes of administration, and encourage those who only inject to use routes of administration that have less risk than injection. Kits can be simple or contain numerous complimentary supplies, all of which have personal and public health functions. It can be helpful to include education on the use of an injection alternative prior to use so that they can be implemented most effectively. Here you will find basic supplies that can make up each kit. Each program packs their kits differently depending on participant preference - so consider your participant's preferences as the best practice for your area.

Safer Inhalation Kit - Stem

- Stem
- Chore
- Chore pusher/halved chopsticks
- Mouthpiece
- Alcohol Swab
- Lip balm
- Other considerations: gum, screens, pipe cleaner

Safer Inhalation Kit - Bubble

- Bubble
- Mouthpiece
- Alcohol Swab
- Lip balm
- Other considerations: gum, pipe cleaner

Powder Kit

- Straws (halved and multicolored or patterned)
- Scooper
- Plastic razor
- Blank card
- Other considerations: nasal swab/lip balm for nose, water/saline ampule

Boofing/Booty Bumping Kit

- Needle-less syringe (something smooth, not too rigid at the tip) ***a detachable needle can be used to draw, but should be taken off before administration.**
- Cooker
- Lube
- Water ampule
- Other considerations: latex gloves, halved chopstick or scooper for mixing, vitamin E suppository
