Notice of Deficiencies, Recommended Civil Monetary Penalty, and
Opportunity for Hearing

Dear Pharmacy Manager:

The Maryland Board of Pharmacy (the “Board”) conducted an annual inspection of Acme Pharmacy (the “Pharmacy”) on September 4, 2025, for compliance with statutes and regulations governing the operation of a pharmacy. The Board’s inspection report indicated that the Pharmacy was not compliant with laws relating to pharmacy technician registration and CDS prescription compliance. Specifically, the Board’s inspector noted a technician trainee (“Trainee A”) on staff who was beyond the six (6) month registration exemption period for technician trainees. The Board subsequently obtained documents from the Pharmacy indicating that Trainee A performed delegated pharmacy acts beyond the six (6) month registration exemption period. In addition, the inspector’s CDS audit noted several concerns such as CDS prescriptions filled with high quantities, patients or prescribers outside of the local area, a patient address as a P.O. Box, and cash payment.

I. FINDINGS AND CONCLUSION

The Board finds that the Pharmacy permitted Trainee A to perform delegated pharmacy acts beyond the six-month registration exemption period for pharmacy technician trainees and without other authorization between approximately June and November 2025. The Board also finds that the Pharmacy filled prescriptions for controlled dangerous substances that only included a post office box for the patient’s address instead of a street address and failed to document verification for other CDS prescriptions of concern.

Based upon the deficiencies noted at your Pharmacy, the Board finds that the Pharmacy is in violation of the Maryland Pharmacy Act and the regulations adopted thereunder. Specifically, the Board finds the Pharmacy in violation of Health Occ. Art. §§ 12-403(c) (1) and 12-6B-01, and 21 CFR 1306.04 and 1306.05(a).

II. RECOMMENDED CIVIL MONETARY PENALTY

Under Maryland Health Occupations Article § 12-410 and COMAR 10.34.11, the Board of Pharmacy has the authority to impose a civil monetary penalty based upon violations of the Maryland Pharmacy Act.

Based upon the deficiencies cited at the Pharmacy, the Board hereby recommends the imposition of a **civil monetary penalty of \$1,000.00**. The deficiencies upon which the civil monetary penalty is based are set forth above in this Notice and in the Board's inspection report, dated September 4, 2025.

In determining the recommended civil monetary penalty, the Board took into consideration the aggregating and mitigating factors outlined in COMAR 10.34.11.08.

III. FOLLOW-UP ACTIONS REQUIRED; INSPECTION

Please be advised that the Board of Pharmacy may perform a follow-up inspection of the Pharmacy to ensure that the deficiencies noted herein have been addressed and corrected. Should the follow-up inspection indicate that the Pharmacy has further deficiencies, the Board may pursue further disciplinary action against the Pharmacy that may result in the imposition of sanctions such as suspension, revocation or additional monetary penalties.

IV. OPPORTUNITY FOR HEARING

If the Pharmacy disputes the findings, conclusions or the proposed civil monetary penalty, the Pharmacy may request an evidentiary hearing on the Board's decision in this matter. In the event that the Pharmacy requests an evidentiary hearing, the Board shall initiate formal proceedings which will include the opportunity for a full evidentiary hearing. The hearing will be held in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act, Md. Code Ann. State Gov't § 10-201 *et seq.*, and COMAR 10.34.01. Any request for a hearing must be submitted in writing to Trina Leak, Pharm.D., Maryland Board of Pharmacy, 4201 Patterson Ave., 5th Floor, Baltimore, Maryland 21215, **no later than thirty (30) days of the date of this Notice**.

Please be advised that at the hearing the Pharmacy would have the following rights: to be represented by counsel, to subpoena witnesses, to call witnesses on its own behalf, to present evidence, to cross-examine witnesses, to testify, and to present summation and argument. Should the Board find the Pharmacy in violation of the Maryland Pharmacy Act, the Board may suspend or revoke the pharmacy permit, impose civil penalties, or both. If the Pharmacy requests a hearing but fails to appear, the Board may nevertheless hear and determine the matter in its absence.

V. OPTION TO PAY RECOMMENDED CIVIL MONETARY PENALTY

Alternatively, the Pharmacy may pay the recommended civil monetary penalty **within thirty (30) days** of the date of this Notice, in the form of a certified check or money order made payable to the Maryland Board of Pharmacy.

Upon the Pharmacy's payment of the civil monetary penalty, this Notice will constitute the Board's final action with respect to the September 4, 2025, inspection, and shall be a public document and order under the Maryland Public Information Act, Md. Code Ann., General Provisions Art. § 4-101, *et seq.*, and posted and reported in accordance with State and federal laws.
