Notice of Deficiencies, Recommended Civil Monetary Penalty, and
Opportunity for Hearing

Dear Pharmacy Manager:

On June 4, 2019, the Board of Pharmacy (the “Board”) conducted an annual inspection of CVS #04225 (the “Pharmacy”) for compliance with statutes and regulations governing the operation of a pharmacy. The Board’s inspection indicated that the Pharmacy was not compliant with laws governing pharmacist administration of vaccines. Specifically, the Pharmacy employed a staff pharmacist (T.H.) who did not have active CPR certification as required in order to be registered with the Board to administer vaccines. The Board also received additional documentation indicating that the pharmacist administered approximately 341 vaccines without active CPR certification. The Board’s records indicate that the pharmacist subsequently updated the CPR certification on June 5, 2019.

I. FINDINGS AND CONCLUSION

The Board adopts as finds that the Pharmacy permitted a staff pharmacist (T.H.) to administer vaccinations without active CPR certification obtained through in-person classroom instruction as required by the Board’s regulations.

Based upon deficiencies at the Pharmacy, the Board finds that the Pharmacy is in violation of the Maryland Pharmacy Act and the regulations adopted thereunder. Specifically, the Board finds the Pharmacy in violation of Health Occ. Art. § 12-403(c)(1) and § 12-508(b)(2).

II. RECOMMENDED CIVIL MONETARY PENALTY

Under Maryland Health Occupations Article § 12-410 and COMAR 10.34.11, the Board of Pharmacy has the authority to impose a civil monetary penalty based upon violations of the Maryland Pharmacy Act.

Based upon the deficiencies reported at the Pharmacy, the Board hereby recommends the imposition of a **civil monetary penalty of \$1,000.00**. The deficiencies upon which the civil monetary penalty is based are set forth in the findings above and the Inspection Report, dated June 4, 2019.

In determining the recommended civil monetary penalty, the Board took into consideration the aggregating and mitigating factors outlined in COMAR 10.34.11.08.

III. FOLLOW-UP ACTION/INSPECTION

Please be advised that the Board of Pharmacy may perform a follow-up inspection of the Pharmacy to ensure that the deficiencies noted the Report have been addressed and corrected. Specifically, all staff pharmacists who are registered to administer vaccinations must have proof of proper and active CPR certification obtained through in-person classroom instruction. Should the follow-up inspection indicate that the Pharmacy has further deficiencies, the Board may pursue further disciplinary action against the Pharmacy that may result in the imposition of sanctions such as suspension, revocation or additional monetary penalties.

IV. OPPORTUNITY FOR HEARING

If the Pharmacy disputes the findings, conclusions or the civil monetary penalty, the Pharmacy may request an evidentiary hearing on the Board's decision in this matter. In the event that the Pharmacy requests an evidentiary hearing, the Board shall initiate formal proceedings which will include the opportunity for a full evidentiary hearing. The hearing will be held in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act, Md. Code Ann. State Gov't § 10-201 et seq., and COMAR 10.34.01. Any request for a hearing must be submitted in writing to Rochen Wang, Pharm.D, Pharmacist Investigator Supervisor, Maryland Board of Pharmacy, 4201 Patterson Ave., 5th Floor, Baltimore, Maryland 21215, **no later than thirty (30) days from the date of this Notice.**

Please be advised that at the hearing the Pharmacy would have the following rights: to be represented by counsel, to subpoena witnesses, to call witnesses on its own behalf, to present evidence, to cross-examine witnesses, to testify, and to present summation and argument. Should the Board find the Pharmacy guilty of the violations cited in the Reports, the Board may suspend or revoke the pharmacy permit, impose civil penalties, or both. If the Pharmacy requests a hearing but fails to appear, the Board may nevertheless hear and determine the matter in its absence.

V. OPTION TO PAY RECOMMENDED CIVIL MONETARY PENALTY

Alternatively, the Pharmacy may pay the recommended civil monetary penalty **within thirty (30) days** of the date of this Notice, in the form of a certified check or money order made payable to the Maryland Board of Pharmacy.

Upon the Pharmacy's payment of the civil monetary penalty, this Notice will constitute the Board's final action with respect to this case regarding the deficiencies related to inspection of June 4, 2019, and shall be a final order and public document in accordance with the Maryland Public Information Act. Md. Code Ann., General Provisions Art. § 4-101, et seq., and reported and posted in accordance with State and federal laws.
