
















### **Homicides in Maryland**





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### **Gender Identity**

- MVDRS:
  - 918 female identified victims (2012-2021 MVDRS)
  - 1.59% of female homicide victims transgender
- Williams Institute at UCLA School of Law
  - 2.08% of age 13-17 transgender (YRBS)
  - 0.51% of age 18+ transgender (BRFSS)
- Disproportionate?




### Intimate Partner Violence (IPV) in Maryland

- 2012 National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Survey
- Sexual violence, physical violence, and/or stalking
  - 34.4% among women
  - 28.8% among men




## Female Homicide Victims by Age, 2012-2021






# IPV-Related Female Homicide Victims by Age, 2012-2021





## Female Homicide Victims by Race/Ethnicity, 2012-2021





# IPV-Related Female Homicide Victims by Race/Ethnicity, 2012-2021

Circumstance	%
Intimate partner violence	32%
Argument	26%
Precipitated by other crime	10%
Caretaker abuse/neglect	6%
Physical fight	6%
Precipitating crime in progress	5%
Family problems	4%
Substance use disorder	4%

Circumstance	%
Drug-related	4%
Current mental health problem	3%
Jealousy	3%
Interpersonal violence	3%
History of behavioral health treatment	2%
Walk-by attack	2%
Alcohol problem	2%




# Circumstances in IPV-Related Female Homicides, 2012-2021

Circumstance	%
Argument	48%
Physical fight	11%
Jealousy	9%
Interpersonal violence	7%
Precipitated by other crime	6%
Substance use disorder	4%



# Victim-Suspect Relationship in Female Homicides, 2012-2021






<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>3</sup>Other known to victim includes: acquaintance, babysitter, co-worker, friend, and roommate,

### **MVDRS Variable Expansion**

- New variables have been added to NVDRS and are being collected:
  - Victim known to authorities
  - Household known to CPS
  - Family stressor
  - Corporal punishment



#### **Conclusions**

- Increase in female homicide victims in 2020-2021
- Increase in intimate partner violence in 2020-2021
- More research and surveillance is needed
- Improving data
- Need for consistent funding for IPV prevention
