




# HIV IN ALLEGANY COUNTY, 2021

DATA REPORTED THROUGH JUNE 30, 2022

## New HIV Diagnoses

In 2021, there were 2 people diagnosed with HIV in Allegany County.

- Over the past 5 years, there have been a total of 24 new HIV diagnoses in Allegany County.
- Of the 24 HIV diagnoses in the past 5 years, 54.2% were among NH-White people, and 20.8% were among NH-Black people. Furthermore, 45.8% of the diagnoses were among adults ages 20-29 years old.



## People Living with Diagnosed HIV

At the end of 2021, there were 135 people living with diagnosed HIV in Allegany County.





- Rates (per 100,000) were five times as high in males (364.1) as compared to females (74.8).
- Rates among people living with diagnosed HIV were 6 times higher among NH-Black people (843.3) as compared to NH-White people (144.7). 54.8% of people living with diagnosed HIV in Allegany County were NH-White.
