




# HIV IN BALTIMORE CITY, 2021

DATA REPORTED THROUGH JUNE 30, 2022

## New HIV Diagnoses

In 2021, there were 161 people diagnosed with HIV in Baltimore City.

- 83.9% of the 161 reported HIV diagnoses in Baltimore City during 2021 were among NH-Black people and 6.2% were among Hispanic people.
- Of the 161 HIV diagnoses in 2021, 32.9% were among adults ages 30-39 years old, 29.8% were among those ages 20-29, and 13.0% were among those ages 50-59.



## People Living with Diagnosed HIV

At the end of 2021, there were 10,471 people living with diagnosed HIV in Baltimore City.




- Rates (per 100,000) were two times as high in males (3,079.3) as compared to females (1,321.3).
- Rates among people living with diagnosed HIV were 2 to 5 times higher among NH-Black people (2,902.8) as compared to Hispanic people (1,771.7) and NH-White people (538.3). 83.0% of people living with diagnosed HIV in Baltimore City were NH-Black.
