




HIV IN WASHINGTON COUNTY, 2021

DATA REPORTED THROUGH JUNE 30, 2022

New HIV Diagnoses

In 2021, there were 12 people diagnosed with HIV in Washington County.

- 50.0% of the 12 reported HIV diagnoses in Washington County during 2021 were among NH-White people and 25.0% among NH-Black people.
- Of the 12 HIV diagnoses in 2021, 66.7% were among adults ages 20-39 years old, and 25.0% were among those ages 40-49.



People Living with Diagnosed HIV

At the end of 2021, there were 393 people living with diagnosed HIV in Washington County.





- Rates (per 100,000) were two times as high in males (394.9) as compared to females (198.3).
- Rates among people living with diagnosed HIV were 2 to 5 times higher among NH-Black people (879.5) as compared to Hispanic people (533.1) and NH-White people (176.1). 45.8% of people living with diagnosed HIV in Washington County were NH-White.
