In the last 2 years, they have established the ACHD Continuous Quality Improvement Council which is comprised of rotating members from each area of the Health Department. The committee meets monthly and oversees the QI initiatives of the agency as a whole. Each individual program within the Health Department conducts

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QA/QI activities in collaboration with the Health Officer and the QI Council.

Overall responsibility of the quality of the ACHD HIV Programs lies with the Director of Nursing/ Infectious Disease Program Manager and the HIV Program Supervisor under the leadership of the Health Officer. Welcome to the 2015 RSR Data Submission Season! The Check Your XML feature is now available for providers to review their Client-level data files. This feature allows providers to check data for validation issues and learn early what information needs to be corrected before the RSR Provider Report deadline. Remember, reviewing your client-level data early will allow you to provide the best possible data when completing your submission. Providers may use this feature throughout the reporting season; however, providers will need to upload the corrected Client-level data into the RSR Provider Report once it opens Monday, February 1, 2016.

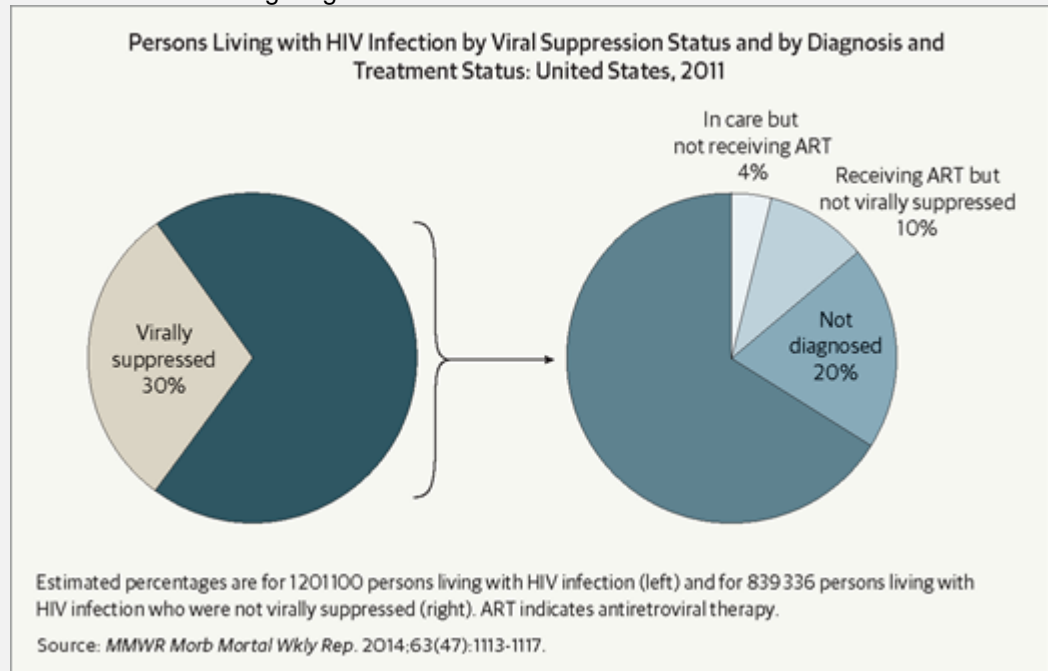

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ABC's of Viral Load Suppression

The Prevention and Health Promotion Administration (PHPA) is continuing to increase awareness on the importance of viral load suppression. Increasing the number of clients with acceptable viral load suppression levels remains a benchmark to improving quality and treatment adherence. Of the estimated 1.2 million people living with HIV in the United States in 2011, only 30% had achieved viral suppression—a key to preventing HIV transmission and living longer with the infection.



Using data from the National HIV Surveillance System and the Medical Monitoring Project, researchers from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reported that, among the 70% of people with HIV whose viral loads were not suppressed, 20% had never been diagnosed with HIV, 66% were diagnosed but had not received HIV medical care, 4% received HIV medical care but not antiretroviral therapy (ART), and 10% took ART but had not achieved viral suppression. Patients 65 years or older had the highest prevalence of viral suppression (37%) while those aged 18 to 24 years had the lowest (13%) (Bradley H et al. *MMWR Morb Mortal Wkly Rep.* 2014;63[47]:1113-1117).

To improve HIV diagnosis rates, the researchers recommended that those at high risk for HIV infection—gay men, people who inject drugs, and those with a sexually transmitted disease—be tested at least annually. In addition, all adults, adolescents, and pregnant women should be tested at least once. Antiretroviral therapy should be prescribed immediately after diagnosis, the researchers added. Better interventions also are needed to reach the two-thirds of people with HIV who aren't receiving HIV medical care. The researchers suggested several strategies: provider notification systems, combined medical and support services, clinic materials promoting engagement in care, and employing clinic staff with expertise working with youth and gay men.

The CDC and the US Department of Health and Human Services are supporting efforts to increase HIV diagnosis, improve access to HIV medical care, reduce viral load, expand the use of HIV surveillance data, conduct research, and improve outcomes.

Regional Updates

First human trials underway in Maryland for HIV vaccine

Scientists at the University of Maryland School of Medicine announced that they're ready to begin the first human trials of a new HIV vaccine. This is a milestone in the long road to find an effective HIV vaccine. This is also extremely complicated.

Dr. Robert Gallo, with the Institute of Human Virology at the University of Maryland School of Medicine, described the vaccine as "just a protein" but different than anything that has been tried before. It's designed to induce a new kind of antibody to target infection right at the start, since the AIDS virus integrates within one day into human genes, and it becomes part of DNA in 24-36 hours.

Gallo said it has taken nine years to get to this stage. The goal of the first phase is to prove his belief that the vaccine is safe. Phase one has started enrolling volunteers, 60 of which are needed. Twenty people will get this vaccine and Gallo said the first person will be injected by the end of this month. Phase two involves linking up with other people's vaccines, Gallo said, in the hope of finding a "one-two punch" that really does the trick.

Women, HIV & Intimate Partner Violence: New Campaign Puts Spotlight on Little-Known Issue During National Domestic Violence Awareness Month

MENLO PARK, Calif., Oct. 20, 2015 – One in three women in the United States experiences intimate partner violence. For women living with HIV, it is one in two. Having an abusive partner is associated with a higher risk for HIV and, for those living with HIV, worse health outcomes. Coinciding with National Domestic Violence Awareness Month, Greater Than AIDS today launched Empowered: Women, HIV and Intimate Partner Violence to bring more attention to the issues and provide resources for women who may be at risk of, or dealing with, abuse and HIV.

The campaign is produced in partnership with the National Domestic Violence Hotline, love is respect, Planned Parenthood Federation of America, Positive Women’s Network-USA and The Well Project, with additional support from The Elizabeth Taylor AIDS Foundation. Anchored by a 20-minute video featuring Tonya Lewis Lee – lawyer, author, producer and longtime advocate for women’s health issues – the campaign takes an up-close look at the issue from the perspective of five women living with HIV who have had experience with, and received services related to, intimate partner violence.

During the intimate conversation, Ms. Lee and the women discuss topics such as recognizing the signs of abuse, getting out and getting help, finding love again and moving forward. “What I took from my conversation with these five women is that this is an issue that can and does affect many women, and with care and support it is possible to move forward,” added Ms. Lee. “I was deeply inspired by them and I know others will be too.”

For women living with HIV, lifetime abuse and the depression and trauma that often accompanies it can make it difficult to keep up with HIV medications and stay connected to care, which can significantly compromise their health. For some, sharing their HIV status can increase abuse or bring on violence.
