

Maryland Weekly Influenza Surveillance Activity Report

A summary of influenza surveillance indicators reported to DHMH for the week ending April 1, 2017

SUMMARY


During the week ending April 1, 2017, influenza-like illness (ILI) intensity in Maryland was **MODERATE** and there was **WIDESPREAD** geographic activity. The proportion of outpatient visits for ILI reported by Sentinel Providers increased, while the proportion reported by Maryland Emergency Departments decreased slightly. The proportion of MRITS respondents reporting ILI also decreased. The proportion of specimens testing positive for influenza at clinical laboratories increased slightly. A total of 39 specimens tested positive for influenza at the DHMH lab. There were 197 hospitalizations and 13 respiratory outbreaks reported to DHMH. Nationally, influenza activity decreased but still remained elevated.

ILINet Sentinel Providers


Thirty-eight sentinel providers reported a total of 8,702 visits this week. Of those, 337 (3.9%) were visits for ILI. This is above the Maryland baseline of 2.2%.

Visits to Emergency Departments for ILI

Emergency Departments in Maryland reported a total of 46,233 visits this week through the ESSENCE surveillance system. Of those, 1,403 (3.0%) were visits for ILL.



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Community-based Influenza Surveillance (MRITS)


MRITS is the Maryland Resident Influenza Tracking System, a weekly survey for influenza-like illness (ILI). A total of 565 residents responded to the <u>MRITS survey</u> this week. Of those, 2 (0.4%) reported having ILI and missing a cumulative 3 days of regular daily activities.


Clinical Laboratory Influenza Testing

Fifty-one clinical laboratories reported performing 5,816 influenza diagnostic tests, mostly rapid influenza diagnostic tests (RIDTs). Of those, 1,692 (29.1%) were positive for influenza. Of those testing positive, 510 (30.1%) were influenza Type A and 1,182 (69.9%) were influenza Type B. The <u>reliability of RIDTs</u> depends largely on the conditions under which they are used. False-positive (and true-negative) results are more likely to occur when the disease prevalence in the community is low, which is generally at the beginning and end of the influenza season and during the summer.



State Laboratories Administration Influenza Testing

The DHMH Laboratories Administration performed a total of 112 PCR tests for influenza and 39 (34.8%) specimens tested positive. Of those testing positive, 27 (69.2%) were positive for Type A (H3), 10 (25.6%) were positive for Type B (Yamagata), and 2 (5.1%) were positive for Type B (Victoria). PCR testing is more reliable than RIDT. The DHMH testing identifies subtypes of influenza A and lineages of influenza B, information that is not available from the RIDT results. The table below summarizes results by type, subtype, and lineage.



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Influenza-associated Hospitalizations


A total of 197 hospitalizations were reported this week. (A person with an overnight hospital stay along with a positive influenza test of any kind, e.g., RIDT or PCR, is considered an "influenza-associated hospitalization" for purposes of influenza surveillance.)

Outbreaks of Respiratory Disease

There were 13 respiratory outbreaks reported to DHMH this week. (Disease outbreaks of any kind are reportable in Maryland. Respiratory outbreaks may be reclassified once a causative agent is detected, e.g., from ILI to influenza.)

National Influenza Surveillance (CDC)

During week 13 (March 26-April 1, 2017), influenza activity decreased but remained elevated in the United States.

- Viral Surveillance: The most frequently identified influenza virus type reported by public health laboratories during week 13 was influenza B. The percentage of respiratory specimens testing positive for influenza in clinical laboratories decreased slightly.
- Pneumonia and Influenza Mortality: The proportion of deaths attributed to pneumonia and influenza (P&I) was below the system-specific epidemic threshold in the National Center for Health Statistics (NCHS) Mortality Surveillance System.
- o Influenza-associated Pediatric Deaths: Seven influenza-associated pediatric deaths were reported.
- Influenza-associated Hospitalizations: A cumulative rate for the season of 57.2 laboratory-confirmed influenza-associated hospitalizations per 100,000 population was reported.
- Outpatient Illness Surveillance: The proportion of outpatient visits for influenza-like illness (ILI) was 2.9%, which is above the national baseline of 2.2%. Six of ten regions reported ILI at or above their region-specific baseline levels. Nine states experienced high ILI activity; five states experienced moderate ILI activity; New York City and nine states experienced low ILI activity; Puerto Rico and 27 states experienced minimal ILI activity; and the District of Columbia had insufficient data.
- <u>Geographic Spread of Influenza:</u> The geographic spread of influenza in 24 states was reported as widespread; Guam, Puerto Rico and 19 states reported regional activity; the District of Columbia and five states reported local activity; two states reported sporadic activity; and the U.S. Virgin Islands reported no activity.
