Treatment for COVID-19

for patients with mild-to-moderate symptoms

If you have been feeling sick and test positive for COVID-19, there may be a treatment available to you. Monoclonal antibody (mAb) treatment may prevent you from getting severely sick. It may also help keep you out of the hospital.

You may be eligible for this treatment if you:

- Test positive for COVID-19
- Have mild-to-moderate symptoms, such as fever, cough, sore throat, nausea, vomiting or loss of taste and smell
- Have been sick for less than 10 days
- Are at high risk of becoming severely sick (for example, due to age [65 years or older], obesity, diabetes OR other chronic illness)

How do I get treatment?

- 1. If you have a doctor: Talk to your doctor as soon as possible. Your doctor can help decide if this treatment is right for you and answer any questions. They can also refer you for treatment by visiting umms.org/ICreferral
- 2. If you do not have a regular doctor: Please contact the Baltimore Convention Center Field Hospital (BCCFH) to speak with a doctor. They can explain mAb treatment and figure out if it is right for you. To reach the BCCFH:

Do I have to pay for this?

You will not personally pay anything for the consultation or treatment. You do not need to have health insurance of any kind to receive mAb treatment. If you have health insurance, the insurance may be charged for this care, but you will not be billed.

If you decide to receive treatment at the BCCFH, free transportation to and from your appointment is available if you need it.
