Statement of Purpose

The purpose of this action is to implement the July 2006 MCO rates.

I. Summary of Economic Impact. A rate increase of \$10,773,090 for the first six months of fiscal year 2007 is due to trend changes for inpatient and outpatient hospitals, and the Medicaid physician fee increase.

A. Rate increase of \$10,773,090 is due to trend changes for inpatient and outpatient hospitals, and the physician fee increase. This is calculated by comparing the previous expected payments of



\$1,711,426,910 in calendar year 2006 against the current expected payments of \$1,722,200,000 in calendar year 2006.

D. There will be a positive impact on the MCOs due to the MCO rate increase.

Notice of Proposed Action [05-344-R]

The Secretary of Health and Mental Hygiene proposes to repeal existing Regulations .01 - .12 in their entirety and to adopt \new Regulations .01 - .52 under COMAR 10.12.04 Day Care for the Elderly and Adults with a Medical Disability. Because substantive changes have been made to the original proposal as published in 32:26 Md. R. 2030 2045 (December 23, 2005), this action is being reproposed at this time.

Statement of Purpose

The purpose of this action is to update licensure requirements to achieve quality care and safe/outcomes for adult day care service participants, establish a license fee, and reorganize the chapter for ease of reading and interpretation. This reproposal contains the following changes to the original proposal:

(1) Regulation .02. The term Prelicensure visit" is

added.

(2) Regulation .04. Several changes are made regarding the license fee and other licensing requirements.

(3) Regulation .06.\Several changes are made regard-

ing requirements for keeping records and reports.

(4) Regulation .09. Several changes are made regarding requirements for notice to participants and minimum daily hours of service provided to participants.

(5) Regulation .10. A change is made to permit exceptions to the requirements regarding a preadmission assess-

ment of a prospective participant.

(6) Regulation .13. Several changes are made regarding the requirements for the number and types of staff and

their qualifications. Terminology is also changed.

(7) Regulation .14. Several changes are made regarding the requirements for the observation of participants and for an emergency plan. Also, the requirement regarding the presence of a staff member trained in first aid and CPR is deleted because it is duplicative of language contained in proposed COMAR 10.12/04.18.

(8) Regulation .16. A change is made regarding the review and updating of medication orders. Terminology is also

changed.

(9) Regulation .18. The requirement regarding the presence of a staff member trained in first aid and CPR is

(10) Regulation .19. Several changes are made regarding providing a participant with food that meets a percentage of the recommended dietary allowance of the Food and Nutrition Board of the National Research Council.

(11) Regulation .20. A change is made regarding the requirement for how often a comprehensive assessment must be completed.

(12) Regulation .23. Several changes are made regarding the requirement that a written notice of discharge be issued to the participant or the participant's responsible

(13)\Regulation .26. A change is made regarding the requirement that a center shall maintain medical confirmation that a staff member is free from tuberculosis in a communicable\form.

(14) Regulation .27. A citation to a/nonexistent regulation is deleted. Also, a change is made regarding the requirement that a participant may not be left in a vehicle when staff is not present.

(15) Regulation .29. A change is made regarding the required condition of furniture.

(16) Regulation .31. A change is made regarding the requirement for hand-washing facilities.

(17) Regulation .45. A change is made regarding the

criteria for banning new admissions.

(18) Regulation .47. Several changes are made regarding the maximum amounts of civil money penalties that may be imposed.
