


**50%** of all new sexually transmitted infections (STIs) in the U.S. each year are in teens and young adults<sup>1</sup>


#### Most STIs have no symptoms and without treatment can cause serious health problems

Montgomery County high school students who reported drinking alcohol or using drugs the last time they had sex<sup>3</sup>
