

#### Most STIs have no symptoms and without treatment can cause serious health problems

Talbot County high school students who reported ever having sex<sup>3</sup>

Talbot County high school students who reported drinking alcohol or using drugs the last time they had sex<sup>3</sup>

Alcohol and drug use may impair decision-making about having sex, condom use and consent
